# HAMSTER HINTS

**Most of our modern radios are capable of utilizing a computer interface.**

In fact, I would bet that most hams these days have a computer, right in their shack, which is more or less dedicated to the routine operations of the hobby. For instance, it might allow direct- or remote-control of multiple radios, provide logging capability, facilitate digital-mode communications, help in rotating directional antennas, provide practice- and learning- tools, and, of course, give convenient access to relevant information from the Internet. We tend to build-up such capabilities over time, and, before we know it, we have a lot invested in a well-working configuration, and it becomes a valuable--if not a critical--shack asset. So, what happens if, say, the hard-drive crashes?

As with *any* important data, a Backup-and-Restore solution is a critical part. Notice that I did not simply call it "a Backup solution." I have learned it is very important to thoroughly test one's complete work and assumptions, meaning one must make sure to test the "Restore" part of the procedure, as well. Take it full-circle. There are too many things that can go wrong, and all of these bugs need to be worked-out *well ahead of* an actual data emergency. If you don't know exactly how to do the Restore--and haven't actually seen it work--then, really, you don't have a reliable Backup. Admittedly, you probably don't need to test the restoration of *every single* backup you make, but you should test the full Restore procedure, at least once--and also test it again after making any significant change to it. (Incidentally, I prefer ***cloning*** the entire drive, including the O/S, even though I also employ interim, file-by-file copy techniques, for backing-up my "User" directories.) Too often we postpone these tasks, or only complete them "half-way." A fleshed-out, total solution was one of my recent projects. ...Is it time for *you* to reconsider Backup-and-Restore? (;

I see there is even a special day dedicated to this subject: March 31 was World Backup Day! I hope everyone makes it a priority to backup their important systems. For [EmComm](#), think of this as yet one more way to be fully prepared to operate in a disaster situation.

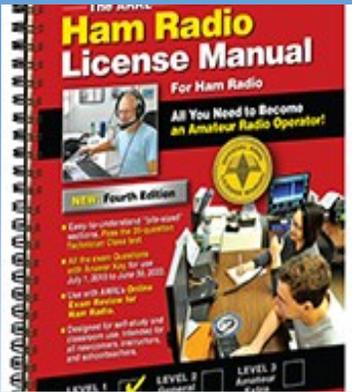


**Thanks to BJ (KCONPF) for getting the 443.850 MHz D-Star Repeater on the 30C reflector.** I'm told that the reflector is pretty active and being used locally. We have discussed trying to determine the feasibility of upgrading the repeater for some of the newer reflectors.

It has been noted that the Fusion repeater may be having some issues and investigation is on-going. It may be related to power output.

Steve (W0STV), has mentioned on the reflector that we have the go ahead from [125 Live](#) to place a remote station there which we also want to be used on-site. I expect that we will be setting up a committee to work on identifying the equipment we would like to install. Once determined, it was mentioned to see if we can get an ARRL grant to cover some of the cost. I was mentioned that 125 Live would like to have classes and is a good opportunity for us to introduce ham radio to more people.

- ♦ **Thursday 6:30 p.m.** 147.255 Repeater. The first Net of each month is a voice net, and it's the SE MN District ARES Digital Net. The other weeks, it is an informal digital net, using MT63/2KL protocol and NBEMS.

*Most of us use [FLDIGI](#) and the rest of the [NBEMS](#) suite of programs, all of which are free. MT63 is a very forgiving mode. You can do MT63 on VHF without a soundcard modem - 'acoustic coupling' works fine. meaning you can hold your HT up to the mic on your computer and copy it very well and do the reverse to transmit.*

- ♦ **Thursday 8 p.m.** HF Digital Net, 3583.5 kHz, Olivia 8/500
- ♦ **Daily M-F about 11:30 a.m.** - Repeater Of The Week - Very Informal Morning Net - If you show up and there is no net control, become one! The object of this net is to encourage more on-air activity.
- ♦ **Saturday 8:30 p.m.** Iowa D-Star Net on RARC D-Star Reflector XLS632A
- ♦ **Sunday 7:30 p.m.** Minnesota D-Star Net on RARC D-Star Reflector XLS632A
- ♦ **Sunday 8:30 p.m.** Dodge County ARES Net on the 147.255 Repeater at 8:30 p.m.
- ♦ **Sunday 9:00 p.m.** RARC/ARES Net rotates between the 146.820 Repeater on even numbered Sundays and the 147.255 Repeater on odd numbered Sundays at 9:00 p.m.
