Interstate 90/Highway 52 Interchange Construction north of Marion, MN. Please see detour map and directions to Marion KOA on page 5.






Contest Corner

Summer is ebbing away! Many of us have antenna projects and improvements to complete as we head into August. Hard to believe the primetime contesting is quickly approaching. There are more "warm up" contests in August including:

- August 2-3 North American QSO Party (NAQP) CW, this is always a casual and friendly get together. You can do as much or as little as you want. The exchange is your name and state.
- **August 9-10** Worked All Europe CW (WAE), This is also a type of QSO party except that the objective for US stations is to work only the 50 sovereign EU countries. There is also a twist in that you can earn additional points by passing traffic called QTCs (data of previously logged QSOs), to the EU stations. You will need to brush up on the QTC rules and use a logging program which automates the exchange. I use N1MM. A detailed explanation and implementation of N1MM features for this contest is here.
- August 16-17 <u>SARTG WW</u> RTTY Contest, This is a fun RTTY contest sponsored by our Scandinavian friends.
 There are just a handful of international RTTY events each year. This one is a good one with support and nice award certificates.
- August 16-17 North American QSO Party (NAQP) SSB, This is the SSB version of the CW NAQP. Keep in mind that this a 12-hour contest but you can only operate 10 hours max so there is still time to enjoy the weekend. Power is limited to 100 watts. I like this one because you can put a face behind some of the people you meet on the CW segments.
- August 30-31 <u>WW Digi Contest</u>: Since its debut in 2019 this Digi contest is very popular. It's sponsored by
 the Slovenia Contest Club and the Worldwide Radio Foundation Club. It has some unique scoring that's generated by the WSJT-X suite of programs. If you're new to digi conte As you can see there is something for everyone in July. Check the <u>WA7BNM calendar</u> website for more August contests.



Contest Corner

Although not typically a contesting topic QSL cards are an important amateur radio tradition. They serve as confirmation of two-way radio communications. Originating in the early 20th century, the term "QSL" comes from the Q code meaning "I confirm receipt of your transmission." Initially QSLs were simple postcards. These cards evolved to include details like call signs, date, time, frequency, and signal reports, often featuring personalized designs reflecting the operator's photo, interests, location, or equipment. In the 60s and 70s new hams would get ads from QSO card printers who often knew your call even before the official FCC "ticket" arrived.

Besides their primary function of verifying contact, QSL cards are/were collected, with hams often adorning their shacks with cards from rare DX (distance) contacts or unique designs. They are also important "proof" of contact for earning various amateur radio awards and certificates, such as "Worked All States" (WAS) or "DX Century Club" (DXCC), where confirmed contacts are required for issuing the award. Despite the advent of digital logging and confirmation systems like Logbook of The World (LoTW), and eQSL the physical QSL card is part of ham radio heritage and historical significance.

These days, every idea that anyone has, for making money or just trying to waste your attention for a few minutes, is called a "hack" (I find this unfortunate). Mostly I hate how the usemeanings of words get diluted, for no good purpose, I refuse to refer to any Hamster Hint by this label.

This month is a grab-bag describing a couple of **hints or tricks.** The first involves the repair of my wheelbarrow's cracked plastic rim, using a dowel, a couple of wood screws, and a few sticks of hot glue (see photo's). I've used this technique on several other plastic items, especially when the plastic is of a type (like Nylon) which won't bond to "Plastic-Bonder" epoxy. Be sure to clean the surfaces well before applying the glue; roughing them up a bit with sandpaper can also help the hot-melt glue to stick better. (I use my wheelbarrow to haul-away some of dirt from the holes I dig for antenna masts!)



Here is my favorite, for this month: a way replace ropes or para-cords, in wire-antenna anchors, from the ground (assuming the cord still free-moving in the pulley, which is up in the tree, at the lanyard/anchor). Simply use a small flame to liquify the plastic material of the cords, on their ends. Do this, at the same time, to the old cord and the new cord, then push the two ends into each other, to fuse them together. Wear at least one old glove, you can shape the joint "flat" (or 'round, as the case may be) without burning your fingers, as it cools and re-solidifies. This creates relatively strong joint that may be pulled up and easily passed through the pulley. It is stronger, more flexible, and more "linear" than a joint made using tape, for instance, to hold the two cords together.

Finally, I've included one photo of the apparatus I used recently to "drop" a weighted para-cord over a high tree branch, using my long, aluminum pole. Once the 'K-tool' was in place, I pulled hard on the camo-cord, to release the clamped paint-stick (and thus the padlock and red para-cord). The weight fell on the other side of the branch, pulling the red line with it.
