



It switches between two repeaters 147.255 and 146.820 both pl100 depending on the date of the net. You may also check into the net by using the Echolink phone app from anywhere in the world by going to node 420993. We do allow a segment of time for these check ins during the nets.

You may also check in by email to <u>w0mxw@yahoo.com</u> before and during this net. Include your call, first name and city or town you are in. These will be announced during the Net.

Ater the September RARC meeting on Meshtastic we may set up a Thursday Mesh net and see how well the network can handle high traffic and to test its other features. We will ask about this after the program to see what the interest is.

If you have any questions, comments, information or have something you want the RARC or ARES to do or know put it on the RARC groups io reflector.

There is one more public service event this year. That is to help Winona ARC with their Ride the Ridges race on September 20th. This race covers three counties and has a maximum 100+ mile course. September kicks off the Minnesota Wireless Association's, (MWA), 2025-2026 contest season. The sixteen (16) events for this season and the team assignments can be found on the MWA website. The annual membership meeting will be held Sep-

tember 23, 2025 at Broadway Pizza in Blaine, Minnesota. The social hour starts at 5 pm with a meal and program following at 6 pm. The presentations will be on the online Contest Scoreboard and Real Time Contesting. Here are the highlights for the this month:

September 13–15 <u>ARRL September VHF Contest</u>

- Bands: 50 MHz and above (VHF/UHF)
- Modes: CW, SSB, FM, Digital (FT8, MSK144, etc.)
- **Participation**: Very high, especially among U.S. and Canadian operators. It's one of the ten ARRL Affiliated Club Competition events, which boosts club-level participation
- Objective: Work as many stations in as many different Maidenhead grid squares as possible.
- Categories: Includes Single Operator, Rover, Multioperator, FM Only, and 3-Band categories.
- Log Submission: Logs are submitted electronically via Cabrillo format and are publicly listed

September 28–29 CQ World Wide DX Contest – RTTY This is the first of the MWA's list of competitive events.

- Mode: RTTY (Radio Teletype)
- Bands: HF (160 through 10 meters)
- Participation: Over 15,000 logs submitted annually, making it one of the largest digital mode contests globally
- **Objective**: Work as many DX stations as possible across all continents.

State QSO Parties These are popular for their friendly nature and localized focus. Notable ones in September include:

- Texas QSO Party
- Iowa QSO Party
- New Jersey QSO Party
- New Hampshire QSO Party
- Washington State Salmon Run
- Maine QSO Party

Each of these contests typically sees hundreds to thousands of logs submitted, especially from local operators and rovers.

Check the <u>WA7BNM calendar website</u> for the dates and times of these niche weekend operating events. The website offers historical and current data on contest schedules, log due dates, and participation trends. It's a go-to resource for contest planning and analysis.


Hamster Hints

Bob (KEOEXE)

Here is how I stiffened-up the handle on a wide push-broom, which kept breaking when I would use it.

Note the use of wood-glue and toothpicks, tapped into place using a hammer. I often use this technique to repair knot-holes and other defects in structural wood members. After the glue dries for at least half a day or so, trim off the ends of the toothpicks (and the extra glue), using a low-kerf, flexible, flush-cut saw. Finally, sand the area. I did that to these new braces and the original handle, then I gave it all a couple coats of polyurethane, to protect it, long-term.

Most use <u>FLDIGI</u> and the rest of the <u>NBEMS</u> suite of programs, all of which are free. MT63 is a very forgiving mode. You can do MT63 on VHF without a soundcard modem - 'acoustic coupling' works fine. meaning you can hold your HT up to the mic on your computer and copy it very well and do the reverse to transmit.

Parks On The Air ® (POTA)


It's FALL POTA Time!
